<b>Training</b>	Good quality staff training	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All school staff receive regular training on HSB informed by national and local evidence.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>DSLs receive training relevant to HSB and disseminate to school staff. Or</li> <li>HSB training that is delivered to all school staff is not drawn from national or local expertise. Or</li> <li>HSB training for all school staff is delivered on a less than annual basis.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School staff do not receive training relevant to HSB. Or</li> <li>Training delivered to the DSL is not drawn from national or local expertise. Or</li> <li>Training is delivered at a less than annual basis to the DSL for the purposes of dissemination.</li> </ul>
<b>Referral pathway</b>	HSB referral pathway within school	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School staff use well-established internal referral pathways to raise concerns about inappropriate and problematic HSB to trigger early intervention.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Some staff raise concerns about inappropriate and problematic HSB, on an ad hoc basis, which sometimes triggers early intervention.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school has a limited response to inappropriate or problematic forms of HSB.</li> <li>There is a perception amongst school staff that this type of behaviour cannot be addressed.</li> </ul>
<b>RSE</b>	Relationships and sex education	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>RSE is embedded throughout the wider curriculum across all years, informs the school's ethos, and is informed by high-quality resources, local expertise and national guidance.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>RSE is delivered to all year groups as a discrete topic.</li> <li>RSE is drawn from local expertise and national guidance.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>RSE education is delivered to a limited number of students/year groups. Or</li> <li>RSE is developed without reference to national guidance or local expertise.</li> </ul>
<b>Prevention and incident management</b>	The relationship between incident management and prevention	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Actions taken by the school following incidents set a tone and expectation for the wider student body that contribute to the prevention of further incidents. For example, a swift response to an allegation of touching in corridors demonstrates to students that such behaviour is unacceptable, will not be tolerated and that complaints will be taken seriously.</li> <li>Students and staff perceive that issues associated with HSB are addressed.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Swift actions taken by the school following incidents of HSB.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A limited response to incidents of HSB at school has the potential to normalise such behaviours: for example incidents of non-consensual sharing of images have not been addressed.</li> </ul>
<b>Ethos</b>	School ethos	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school actively promotes healthy and positive relationships, gender equality and acceptance of difference.</li> <li>Students and staff recognise, welcome and participate in this ethos.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School has taken some steps to promote positive relationships, gender equality and acceptance of difference.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The dominant culture amongst students and staff features evidence of harmful attitudes and the school is yet to take effective steps to address this.</li> </ul>
<b>Response to local concerns</b>	Response to emerging concerns in the local environment	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school takes proactive steps to respond to trends identified by the local partnership prior to incidents occurring. For example following a MA meeting where concerns are raised following HSB on a particular social media platform an assembly is held within the school for students and/or parents are notified.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school takes steps to respond to trends identified by the local partnership once they affect their students.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school is not aware of trends identified by the local MA partnership which may affect their students.</li> </ul>

The definition is clearly referenced in relevant school policies and other documentation.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Multiple definitions of HSB are used within the school. And/or</li> <li>HSB definition(s) used within the school do not reflect those of the MA partnership.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A definition for HSB is not yet used within the school.</li> </ul>
<b>HSB trends</b>	HSB trends identification	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school has systems in place to flag HSB, e.g. on safeguarding and behaviour incident logs.</li> <li>The school uses data to identify trends associated with HSB; chronologies are used to contextualise incidents that have occurred and peer-group mapping exercises are used to support prevention.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School staff have an awareness of HSB trends.</li> <li>Systems to formally record or track HSB, such as HSB flags, are not yet fully in place within the school.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Systems to record or track HSB, e.g. HSB flags, are not yet in place at the school.</li> </ul>
<b>Resources</b>	Awareness of and access to resources to assist identification of HSB	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Staff at all levels are aware of, and have access to, up-to-date HSB resources that facilitate understanding of thresholds and identification of harm. For example, school staff use the Brook traffic light system.</li> <li>HSB resources used by the school are aligned with those used by the MA partnership.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The DSL has access to and understanding of HSB resources to assist identification.</li> <li>The staff rely on a referral to the DSL to ascertain level of harm.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School staff do not have access to HSB resources to assist identification, resulting in some forms of HSB being undetected or not recognised as harmful.</li> </ul>
<b>Disclosure options</b>	Options for disclosure of HSB	<p>Students are offered and use a variety of mechanisms for safely disclosing their concerns and/or concerns about peers in relation to HSB: for example there are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>multiple trusted individuals within school to disclose to; and</li> <li>safe spaces in which to access staff; and</li> <li>mechanisms for anonymous disclosure.</li> </ul>	<p>Students are offered and use mechanisms for safely disclosing their concerns and/ or concerns about peers in relation to HSB: for example there are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>trusted individuals to disclose to; or</li> <li>a safe space in which to access staff; or</li> <li>mechanisms for anonymous disclosure.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Students do not use mechanisms for disclosure of HSB concerns. Or</li> <li>Mechanisms for disclosure of HSB concerns are not apparent. Or</li> <li>Students are unclear about how staff will use information that they give in a disclosure.</li> </ul>

<b>Policy framework</b>	Policy framework for response	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school is aware of, and responds to, HSB incidents in accordance with statutory guidance (KCSIE) and national advice on sexual violence in schools.</li> <li>A Contextual Safeguarding framework is applied for responses to HSB incidents.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school is aware of, and responds in accordance with, statutory guidance (KCSIE) and national advice on sexual violence in schools to some HSB incidents.</li> <li>The school engages with child protection frameworks within which the wider MA partnership works, in addition to any requirements made by KCSIE, to inform their response.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The school responds to HSB incidents independently of reference to national guidance or advice.</li> </ul>
<b>Wellbeing of students</b>	Wellbeing of students involved	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The on-going welfare of those involved in HSB incidents is monitored and reviewed, and further action is taken by the school (and where necessary the partnership) if the initial response appears to be ineffective.</li> <li>The school supports the on-going welfare of the wider student body and has multiple resources that prioritise student mental health.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Responses to HSB incidents continue to monitor on-going risks, and consider the legacy of incidents.</li> <li>Long-term safeguarding measures are allocated to social care professionals alone.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Responses to HSB incidents are time-limited.</li> </ul>
<b>Response to trends</b>	Response to identified trends following an incident	<p>Should a HSB incident reflect wider trends or patterns of behaviour:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Relevant RSE content is reviewed and redelivered.</li> <li>Policies and procedures are reviewed and amended where necessary.</li> <li>Staff monitor for retaliation or evidence of students taking sides and target interventions with the partnership should this occur.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The response to HSB incidents considers the wider student body through the delivery of evidence-based interventions such as assemblies and re-delivery of RSE.</li> </ul>	<p>The response to HSB incidents is focused solely on the individuals directly involved.</p>
<b>Incident referral</b>	Referral of violent, abusive or reoccurring HSB incidents	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School refers HSB incidents to social care.</li> <li>This facilitates a partnership response to the incident.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School makes referrals to social care.</li> <li>School intervention ceases following referral.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>No referral to the partnership following incidents.</li> </ul>
<b>Peer support</b>	Peer support	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>School empowers young people to support each other as part of the response to HSB incidents.</li> <li>Resources are in place to address challenging or negative peer influences associated with HSB incidents, e.g. via bystander approaches.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Risk of negative peer influence associated with HSB incidents is recognised and addressed by the school.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Following HSB incidents young people intervene in sometimes problematic or harmful ways, such as threats or use of violence to discourage disclosure, which are not recognised by school staff.</li> </ul>
